Foreigners (ISBN 9780953444953) and Angler's Moon (ISBN 0953444945) each £6.99, published by The Walmsley Society.

Two books by Yorkshire writer Leo Walmsley, who died more than forty years ago, have been republished by the society formed to celebrate his writing. He wrote about his exploits and adventures amongst the fishing communities in his native Robin Hood's Bay. One of them, Three Fevers was made into a film by J Arthur Rank in 1935.

The newly reprinted books, Foreigners and Angler's Moon, are the latest titles to be added to the society's impressive portfolio and even include special editions in large print.





Foreigners is about a boy's struggle to be accepted into a tight-knit community, while Angler's Moon, his last book, originally published in 1965, covers recollections in Robin Hood's Bay thrugh to his time in Cornwall. They are previously untold stories from his semi-autobiographical novels.
